FATHERS INCORPORATED ANNOUNCED YEARLONG CAMPAIGN WITH WHITE HOUSE AT ANNUAL DINNER

January 18th (Harlem, NY) White House officials were on hand to support Fathers Incorporated as it laid out its plans for a year-long slate of activities to encourage responsible fatherhood and mentoring with the First Annual Heritage Awards Dinner on January 14th at the Alhambra Ballroom in Harlem, NY. Special Assistant to the President and Executive Director of the White House Office of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships, Joshua DuBois, spoke about their support of the Year of Responsible Men. There was several announcements regarding partnerships, events and initiatives, including proclamations from several major U.S. cities in support of the 2011: Year of Responsible Men campaign.

“Fatherlessness is an epidemic, and we know for many children both young and old that the effect of its pain runs deep. In America today, more than 24 million children are unable to call their father’s name in the next room,” says Kenneth Braswell, Executive Director of Fathers Incorporated. “That is why Fathers Incorporated was formed. We are committed to make a difference and get fathers more involved in their children’s lives daily, no matter what the circumstances. As responsible fathers, this is our mission.”

The dinner launched the partnership with the White House, a network of private and public grass-roots organizations, corporate partners and a high profile honorary board. The night also saw five national awardees receive recognition for their work in the field of responsible fatherhood and mentoring; including John Amos, most recognized for his role as James Evans in the television show, “Good Times,” and Geoffrey Canada, CEO of the Harlem Children Zone and a subject of the critically acclaimed documentary “Waiting for Superman.”

The dinner was hosted by Michelle Drayton, Publisher of Today’s Child Magazine and J-Will, host of Albany’s “JWill in the Morning” on Jamz 96.3 (Albany). Pastor Tre’ Staton of the Empire Christian Center served as the Keynote speaker and special Remarks were delivered by Dr. Jeff Gardere, America’s Psychologist and host of VH1’s Dads Camp.

He also shared the Ties Never Broken declaration and wore our signature Blue Bow Tie Lapel. Fathers Incorporated is planning a visit to Nigeria in support of CareFronting Nigeria and their efforts to address the issue of fatherlessness in their county and abroad.

CareFronting-Nigeria is one of two African organizations currently serving as partners for the TIES NEVER BROKEN campaign. In Ghana, the campaign is also embraced by the Ghana Fatherhood Initiative. "We knew going into this work, that our message could be a global one; but never imagined that it would be picked up so quickly and with such dedication to the work ahead, says Kenneth Braswell, Executive Director of Fathers Incorporated. The campaign also received inquiries from England and Australia.

NEW YORK, NY, October 4, 2011- Fathers Incorporated (FI), a national not-for-profit has engaged in responsible fatherhood work on a national and international level since 2004. Recently the organization began a multi-year cause marketing campaign entitled "TIES NEVER BROKEN" to raise the visibility of both Responsible Fatherhood and Mentoring. We are proud to announce that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) has awarded Fathers Incorporated \$7.4 million (over a 3-year period; contingent on continued funding) to manage the National Responsible Fatherhood Clearinghouse (NRFC).

"This contract award allows FI to continue this critical work and great efforts of the White House and DHHS/OFA," says Kenneth Braswell, Executive Director of Fathers Incorporated. "Our team will approach this body of work by integrating innovative marketing systems to inform and educate families. In this effort we hope for the work to evolve and become a mainstay for America's fathers, families, and the field," continues Braswell.

FI is working in partnership with ChildFind of America, ICF International, Mathematica Policy Research and BLH Technologies.

TIES NEVER BROKEN is forming Brand Partnerships to Target Urban Males

Fathers Incorporated, a national leader in the promotion of responsible fatherhood and mentoring, unveiled plans to join forces with major consumer brands to target the urban market with a unique cause marketing initiative. The campaign will employ an aggressive mix of targeted local events, social media, touring exhibits and even pop-up retail in addition to more traditional marketing and media approaches.

Speaking to a group of marketers at a breakfast in midtown Manhattan, Fathers Incorporated's Executive Director Kenneth Braswell, called the initiative, "one of the most important steps taken to date in the battle to reverse the crippling effects of fatherlessness in urban communities." "The Blue Bow Tie represents one of the best chances for an urban-focused program to exist on equal footing with programs like the Pink Ribbon or the Yellow Wristband," said Gary Lewis, a New York based Marketing Consultant. "The Fathers Incorporated program give brands a real chance to do some good in the community while creating legitimate targeted brand marketing programs."

At the breakfast, ESPN's Chris Broussard was introduced as the organization's National Spokesperson and Ben O'Dell, a Deputy Director at the Department of Health and Human Services and a key player in the Obama Administration's Office of Faith Based and Neighborhood Partnerships, also addressed potential marketing partners.

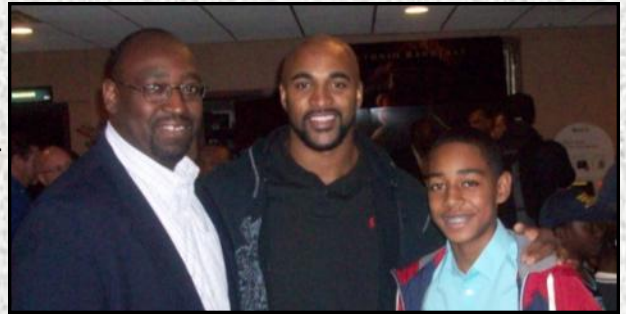
Fathers Incorporated Teamed Up to Present Movie; "COURAGEOUS"

Fathers Incorporated and The Black Star Project Organize National Strategic Planning Summits for Black Male Achievement

Major Urban Cities took part in addressing critical issues affecting Black Males



Under the inspiration of Muhammad Ali's "float like a butterfly, sting like a bee; Rumble Young Man Rumble" rallying cry, major urban cities strategized to address issues of Black Male achievement in their own communities on November 12th. "We spend an awful amount of time laboring over the sobering and tragic statistics facing black males," says Kenneth Braswell, Executive Director of Fathers Incorporated. "As black men, we are way overdue to do something about it and to stop just talking about and waiting for someone to rescue us."

"We are the leaders, we been waiting for," says Shawn Dove, Campaign Manager for the Campaign for Black Male Achievement at the Open Society Foundation. Major urban cities across the nation are far from claiming victory for Black Male achievement. Double digit unemployment rates, incarceration, health disparities, low educational obtainment figures and violence are just a short list of items yet to be addressed for this population of men. Even as America's frustration with the economics of our country continue to bubble under, movements like the Tea Party, Occupy Wall Street and other activities to address poverty are still leaving black males behind.

In Louisville, Kentucky the Open Society Foundation hosted over 75 leaders from around the country who gathered to address how they would mobilize efforts using the spirit of the Muhammad Ali center and his legacy of principles. Muhammad Ali was quoted to say, "Impossible is just a big word thrown around by small men who find it easier to live in the world they've been given than to explore the power they have to change it. Impossible is not a fact. It's an opinion. Impossible is not a declaration. It's a dare. Impossible is potential. Impossible is temporary. Impossible is nothing." It is that sentiment that has inspired this recent urgency of work.

"Much of why this work is so critical can be seen right here in Chicago where more Black children died in Chicago from gunfire in 2008 than Chicago soldiers died in Iraq," says Phillip Jackson, President of The Black Star Project. In addition to high levels of violence, 50 % of all Black men between the ages of 16 and 64 years old are jobless. "These numbers are devastating our families and destroying our communities; and not unique to just Chicago," continues Jackson.

Executive Director Braswell Appears in the Summer Issue of the NAACP's Crisis Magazine

[Q&A] Kenneth Braswell

Activist seeks to promote responsible fatherhood in Black communities > Interview by Monica Utsey

Kenneth Braswell Sr., is the executive director of Fathers Incorporated, a not for profit organization that focuses on encouraging and mentoring fathers to be involved in their families. The former director of the New York State Fatherhood Initiative, where he managed over \$11 million in programs, Braswell has been active in a number of community organizations including the NAACP, Urban League and YMCA. He founded Fathers Incorporated in 2004 when he was going through a difficult custody issue.

was looking around [his family court waiting room] and you could cut the tension with a knife. Fathers and mothers were on different sides of the court and the children were running around not knowing where to show their loyalty. When I walked out of there I wanted to create an organization that would help men deal with custody and child support issues." The mission of Fatherhood Inc. is to promote responsible fatherhood and mentoring as well as provide support and services for fathers. Braswell speaks to *The Crisis* about his goals.

Why was this initiative created?
As we look at the paradigm of our community and family structure, we notice fathers not in leadership positions. We must address the other side and that is men are absent, and someone needs to call attention to that.

"Typically it is always single mothers calling attention to the issues of fatherlessness, we thought this was the opportune time to create an atmosphere for fathers who have been ostracged, have issues, struggle —to create an atmosphere to take the first step by a mailing, calling or writing a letter. We know the first step is not easy.

Why is this initiative needed?
Fathers are necessary. Positive male roles are necessary in the lives of our children and necessary for the development

of our communities. This initiative allows us to have a conversation on a sore subject and forces us to tip into a painful area in our life. Reconnecting with your children as a father is probably the most important thing you will do. This initiative is needed to open that painful door so that we can work together to create a dialogue that will create solutions to our issues and, in some cases, closure.

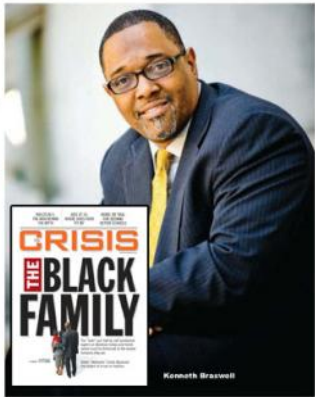
Why is it important to reach out to mothers and grandmothers?

For the most part the mother is the gatekeeper because 80 to 90 percent of mothers are the custodial parents. When you talk about access, like to use the club analogy. The most important person to know at the club is the person at the door. How do you negotiate a relationship with the gatekeeper so you are allowed access to what she protects? A mother sees herself as protecting her children. A father can keep going to court and forcing his way in or he can ask himself, "What do I need to do to prove myself capable of accessing her children? What do I need to do to build trust?"

Grandmothers are important because we are dealing with a much younger population of mothers, and grandmothers have more influence over the mothers.

What is the goal of this initiative?

The goal is to create an atmosphere that allows us to have dialogues around fatherlessness and the need for children to have fathers and be active in the lives of their children. The longer we wait the harder this struggle will be to overcome. ■

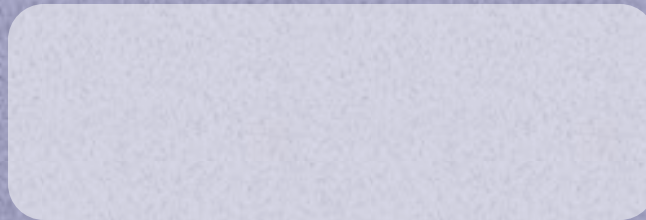
